Pastor Dan's Article

[Jeremiah 1:1 The words of Jeremiah son of Hilkiah, one of the priests at Anathoth in the territory of Benjamin.]

So the book of Jeremiah the prophet begins with the information that Jeremiah was from the line of priests that lived in Anathoth, in Benjamin. When books start like this I get really excited, because I have so many questions! It gives us a picture of who Jeremiah the prophet is, but to understand we have to dig around to find out whether Hilkiah and Anathoth actually mean anything.

When Yahweh gave the people the land of Canaan, several cities (and the nearby fields) were set aside for the Levites to live in. If you remember, the Levites were the worship leaders of Israel. The priests in Yahweh's temple were from one clan of the Levites, and the rest of the tribe performed all kinds of religious duties (singing and/or playing music in the temple, being guards, carrying items for worship). So Jeremiah, the son of a priest, lived in a Levitical town called Anathoth.

Anathoth had a particular history as David's first priest, Abiathar, was from there. He had been a friend and supporter of David even before he was King. Yet, after David died, he was exiled by Solomon when he came to power. Instead, Solomon wanted a priest who was more of a political insider. So Jeremiah's hometown was a quiet place outside the flow of the power brokers in Jerusalem.

The Levites were called to be different from the rest of the people, because they had a job to do. They were tasked with remembering what it meant to be an Israelite; their duty was to be a sacred measuring stick. If they failed to do their job, Israel as an entire nation would be in danger of forgetting that they were Yahweh's special people. So this was a very important job indeed. In fact, we find that at one point in time, the people had lost the temple scroll, and were without the words of the LORD....which is absolutely mind blowing to think about... and it was Jeremiah's father who found them.

Perhaps we shouldn't be surprised that a prophet would come from people who are tasked with remembering the people's story, that's the starting point for a good prophet. Prophecy isn't about future casting; it's about calling people to remember their story. Jeremiah did it in creative ways: Jeremiah wore dirty underwear, wore a cattle yoke on his shoulder. Growing up in a community like Anathoth could only have been a powerful launching pad for Jeremiah's ministry.

It's easy to forget your story. This was why there was a big need for the prophets. The people were forgetful, and God continued to call out to them. He continued to utilize the people who had the memory.

One of the most tragic scenes in the whole Biblical account is in Judges 19-21. We see a Levite traveling around the countryside with a concubine (*Hopefully reading that sentence will cause you to ask why a worship leader has a concubine*). When he is attacked, he offers this young women up to the hoard coming after him, and she is abused so badly that she dies that night. As a result, the whole nation starts a Civil War that almost destroys the tribe of Benjamin. A massive loss of life, all because one of the people responsible to remember God's story, failed to remember, and lived out another story.

This is where it comes to us at St. Mark's. We've been called to constantly remind ourselves of our story, to constantly return to the story. We have the holy duty and sacred task of bearing this story and living it out in our homes, workplaces, and community. If we don't, what will happen to those places? Perhaps the problems that we're seeing in our society and world are the fact that the American church has failed miserably at remembering our story.


My hope and prayer is that our church would be a place like Anathoth. A place where we foster a memory for God's story. And that we would live out that story wherever we go!

St. Mark's Culture & DNA

Our DNA:

While we are all unique and have our own unique DNA, we also as a church have a shared and unique DNA. We utilize the shape of a triangle to explain much of our ministry, vision and structure. This is rooted in the first triangle that represents the three dimensions or focuses of Jesus' life and ministry. Jesus lived his intentional life on earth through three relationships: up, in and out.



Service Focus: The triangle helps us to understand the focus of the ministry of our church based on how Jesus lived his life. up-in-out with the Father, the disciples and the world. As a church, we have recognized our need to focus on service. For many years, like most other churches in our country, we have not done a good job at serving the community and world around us. Those days are over. As a church we have identified three areas of focus for our service, consistent with the life of Jesus and and the Scriptures. The first is reaching in to those who are seen as the 'least of these' in our church, community & world. The second is to reach up to those who are often seen as the last to be considered in our culture. Finally, we reach out to those who are lost and do not know Jesus.

Our Vocabulary:

Most churches (along with other organizations) do not realize that the language and the vocabulary of the organization have great significance to the organization. One of the cornerstones of any culture is language or vocabulary. This month our vocabulary words are *apprentice and equip*.

Least: those who are seen as having little value to a culture and society.

Last: those people in our culture who are often missed and the last on our minds. Their inabilities, personalities, awkwardness or even life choices may have put them in this category for us.

Lost: those who do not know Jesus or have completely walked away from Jesus.

Prodigal: Someone who has left a church or is protesting church or faith for various reasons.

Prayer of the Month:

A simple prayer for our 40 days of prayer as you pray for St. Mark's and our community: God, help St. Mark's to live in your will. Help us to reach the least, last and lost. Help us to care for those in our church family and minister to the prodigals around us. Help us to show the love of Jesus to everyone we encounter and help bring about the Kingdom of God to St. Mark's, Auburn, DeKalb County and the world.

Where Do Our Pastors Come From?

I have been reading some things about the average age of pastors in the church in the U.S. It is not good news. The average age of clergy in the U.S. is 54. Only one in seven pastors is under 40, and half are over 55. The percentage of church leaders 65 and older has nearly tripled in the last 25 years, meaning there are now more pastors in the oldest age bracket than there are leaders younger than 40 (from a study published by Pepperdine University). I do not believe that it is any better in the Lutheran community than anywhere else, and may be worse. But where do pastors come from?

I was asked this question in a workshop: "So, what are you doing about training the next generation of pastors?" My response: "What are you doing?" Where do pastors come from, except out of the mission and ministry of the local church? I remember my home congregation having a fund set aside to send people to the seminary and paying their entire tuition! They celebrated the number of people they had sent. What are we doing about that today?

We have been criticized for not having our own seminary. But why re-invent the wheel when there are a number of great seminaries already doing the work and doing it with integrity, creativity and on-the-job training? On our website you can find the seminaries and pastoral training agencies with whom LCMC has a working relationship. Our Ministry Board meets with the leaders of these seminaries on a regular basis. We are grateful for the 75+ students who are preparing to serve LCMC congregations. But we need to do more.

If you add 10 years to your own life and the life of the congregation of which you are a part, what do you think will happen? All across the U.S., congregations will be searching for pastoral leadership, but the demand will far outstrip the supply. I don't think it is too late—although we are getting close! It is time for us to look around at the people God has called into the congregation, your own members, and ask: "Do any of these people have the gifts for the vocation of ministry? If so, has anyone asked them to consider it? And if there are, is our congregation willing to find a way to support them as they get trained?" Given the creative and faithful use of technology, we can now train people in place—they don't have to move away, leave their jobs and homes, but can begin right now to prepare for the vocation of ministry!

Why do we???...

This is the eighth in a series of articles we will publish in our newsletter every other month or so. It is an opportunity to look at the 'why' of what we do.

Why do we??... Pledge

We have only done pledges and estimates of giving at St. Mark's four years. It has been helpful for our budget planning and planning our ministries and staffing. It has also been a challenge to get the kind of participation we want and need for more accurate planning. While we understand the resistance to offering a pledge or estimate of giving, it can make it difficult to budget and make decisions. We have seen a challenge in the last two years in coming up with an accurate estimate and/or meeting our Operating Fund needs particularly around staffing. So, why is making a pledge or estimate of giving so important?

It is critical for an accurate budget. Much like your family budget, we have to have a good idea of expenses and income to plan an accurate budget. Also like our family budgets, there is no exact way to plan every penny of income and expense, but if we do not have a budget at all or a budget that is clear and accurate, we could run into trouble. If you aim for nothing, you hit your target every time. Our families need an accurate budget as does our church family.

It is needed to plan the ministries of the church. Ministry costs money. Buildings cost money. Bulletins and newsletters cost money. In order to plan what we can and cannot do we have to have an idea of what we need as well as what we have. That way we can make decisions as to the priorities of the church. Decisions such as staffing, mission support, programs and attending denominational gatherings hinge on having a good idea of our income.

It is critical in determining staffing. The vast majority of our budget is staff compensation: Pastor Marcus, Pastor Dan, Laura and Kathy. We need to have a good idea of what to expect in terms of income to decide the number, level and compensation of our staff. This will be especially important the next two years as the funding assistance for Pastor Dan's position goes away.

It helps us to know how and when to move forward. The decisions that are made to help St. Mark's move forward are decisions that are made prayerfully and practically. We make decisions based on the Scriptures, our mission and vision, the strategic plan and resources. Having an idea of income helps us to know what resources are available outside of special gifts and grants to help us move forward and implement our mission and vision using the strategic plan.

There are no grants for operating costs. We have been blessed to receive more than \$300,000 in grants in the last four years. There are many things we would not have without grants - from sound and recording to Pastor Dan and the preschool. There are no grants for churches for operating funds, utilities, repairs & maintenance and sustaining staff compensation. As such, we need a budget that represents these needs and giving to match.

As we enter our stewardship season, we hope that you will consider helping the church in this way. A special thanks to all who work to plan and make decisions for the church and for the generosity of a congregation that loves the Lord and seeks to care for each other and reach people for Jesus!

Operating Fund Snapshot

General Fund/Budget/Operating Fund

The Operating Fund is our yearly budget. This is also called the general fund. This is what Pastor Dan likes to describe as the 'regular' income and expenses of the church. The Operating Fund covers those things that occur on a regular basis such as compensation for Pastor Marcus, Pastor Dan, Kathy and Laura and things such as utilities, insurance and other regular expenses for our staff, building and ministries. This is different from the special (restricted/designated accounts) that cover new initiatives and one-time or special expenses.

Financial Update

We wanted to provide another clear update to our financial standing, particularly the Operating Fund. As you know we sent a letter out in July. Since that letter went out, several things have happened. First, as mentioned in the newsletter last month, the Endowment Trustees approved \$10,000 to assist the Operating Fund. We anticipate that check posting in August. Also, at the August Council meeting, the Council approved \$15,000 to be moved from the reserve set aside to protect Dan's position. This should post in August or early September. We are also thankful for the response of the congregation. July was our best giving month of the year! In fact, if every month were like July, we would be able to meet our Operating Fund needs each month. While we are thankful for the response, we must be cautious as it is critical that we maintain an increased level of giving. We know that many may have made a one time gift that we cannot count on each month and July was a month with 5 Sundays instead of the usual 4. We are hopeful and the finance team is monitoring the situation. We appreciate your prayers and support.

Finance Education for September

Stewardship is an important part of our congregation and something we must address on a regular basis not only for the good of our church, but because it is an important part of our faith as well. Money was the second most talked about topic by Jesus and compromises 15% of the Gospel message. Stewardship is not just about finances, but also the use of our time, talents, skill and spiritual gifts. The Finance Team will be working on this years stewardship initiative in September as we prepare for the budget process for 2018. This is especially important in light of the Operating Fund challenge we have faced this year. The grant for Dan's position ends this year, though we have to maintain the fourth year at minimum. We do have \$5,000 in Funding Our Future that we set aside when we called Dan to help with 2018. The Finance Team will also be working on a budget projection beyond 2017 for the remainder of our Strategic Plan (2019-2021) so that all have a clear idea of our needs as a church both in the present and in the future. Please be sure to read these materials carefully and prayerfully consider your role in supporting the ministries financially here. Many choose not to pledge for a variety of reasons, however having a pledge or an estimate of giving is important as we make decisions about the future. It is especially essential the next 2 years as we make decisions about Pastor Dan's position here at St. Mark's. If you have any questions do not hesitate to contact Pastor Marcus, a Finance Team Member or a Council Member.

The Council recently received this unexpected letter in reference to Pastor Marcus' trip to Nepal and Bangladesh. The Council felt it should be shared with the congregation in the newsletter. Also, we have received a couple questions about the funding for this trip. Funding for the trip came from a variety of sources. Two mission organizations provided most of the funding. Pastor Marcus raised some funds and spent some personal funds. The Council also contributed a small amount from an estate gift the church received. Absolutely zero operating funds were used for this trip.

Greetings in Christ,

From time to time, Christians are called upon to risk their lives, their resources, and their health for the sake of the Gospel taking root in other nations and parts of the world. In much of the developing world, Christianity is very recent, and numerical growth has been exponential. Many missiologists are warning that the church in those places is a "mile wide and an inch deep". 
